THE SAINT-CLAUDE CHURCH CARILLON HAS TAKEN A NEW LIFE

No, the carillon of the parish church of Saint-Claude was not dead! Following a 'metamorphosis' of a few years, it has been reawakened with a completely enhanced new look and sound.

In 1967, Canada's centennial year as well as the 75th anniversary of the Saint-Claude parish, a fundraising project was started for the purchase of an electronic carillon system for the bell tower of the new church. On July 16 of that year, on the occasion of the visit of Archbishop Mgr. Maurice Baudoux, the carillon was heard for the first time.

Some 57 years have since passed, with the carillon ringing out, always with ardor, the noon and 6 p.m hour Angelus, reminding us of the Annunciation of the Angel Gabriel to Mary that she would become the mother of the Savior. This long-standing tradition still continues in many churches in Europe and the Christian world. In St. Claude, the carillon also invited the faithful to religious services: the Sunday masses, the announcement of baptisms, marriages and of funerals. On three occasions the carillon even sounded the death knell announcing the death of popes. Daily at 3:30 p.m., the carillon would play a few pieces of music when classes were being let out. These musical pieces were occasionally tuned to celebrate different seasonal holiday themes.

The carillon let us hear that there was life and prayer in the heart of the parish church and the village.

The sounds of their chimes faded away shortly before COVID-19, but it was not dead; it was to, in due time, transform himself back to life. With the help of financial resources acquired from the parish's special projects funds, the bell tower, now can ring as would 48 brand new bells, cast in bronze, to the sounds of the *Sonata - Verdin Style* electronic bell system.

Thanks to the generous contributions of parishioners, supported by the meticulous work of the Parish Finance Committee, we now will enjoy the sounds of a renewed carillon sound system at the cutting edge of digital electronic technology. The carillon was acquired from Verdin company, established since 1842, in Cincinnati, Ohio.

The Saint-Claude parish thanks with all its heart those who have contributed so much to this rebirth.

“Just have faith”



Today Saint Mark presents us with an avalanche of needy who approach Jesus-Savior seeking comfort and health. Even that day a man named Jairus, the head of the synagogue, made his way through the crowd to implore the health of his little daughter: “My daughter is at the point of death. Please, come lay your hands on her that she may get well and live.” (Mk 5:23).

Who knows if that man knew Jesus by sight, from seeing Him frequently in the synagogue and, finding himself so desperate, decided to invoke His help. In any case, Jesus, grasping the faith of that afflicted father, agreed to his request; only while going to his house did the news come that the girl had already died and that it was useless to bother Him: “Your daughter has died; why trouble the teacher any longer?” (Mk 5:35).

Jesus, realizing the situation, asked Jairus not to be influenced by the pessimistic environment, saying: “Do not be afraid; just have faith.” (Mk 5:36). Jesus asked that father for a greater faith, capable of going beyond doubt and fear. Upon arriving at Jairus' house, the Messiah brought the girl back to life with the words: “Talitha koum,” which means, “Little girl, I say to you, arise!” (Mk 5:41).

We too should have more faith, that faith that does not doubt in the face of life's difficulties and trials, and that knows how to mature in pain through our union with Christ, as Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI suggests in his encyclical *Spe Salvi* (Saved by Hope): “It is not by sidestepping or fleeing from suffering that we are healed, but rather by our capacity for accepting it, maturing through it and finding meaning through union with Christ, who suffered with infinite love.”
